From the Minister David Kraemer

Grace and Compassion

I was driving down the road when up ahead a squirrel began to cross. I was watching and timing my trajectory and his, thinking he will make it across in plenty of time, when at the last moment, he turned where he was

and raced back across the road to the edge, right in front of me.

He was more than half way when he turned. I guess squirrels, or this one anyway, have not yet learned that the yellow lines mark the middle, and that it was actually closer for him to continue on his path than it was to dart back to safety. Apparently he was more comfortable returning to whence he came than in embracing the unknown. (Humans, too, on their own roads, have not yet learned where the center lies).

Anyway, in the last couple of feet, he leaped, bounding into the grass. It was actually quite comical. I thought maybe this is how squirrels get their kicks. They wander into the open where something dangerous might happen, then dart back to safety at the last moment, tempting fate.

The squirrel was safe. I was free to indulge this reverie. Had he been a little slower, or had I been a little faster, he would be dead. I would be sorry. And I would likely not have written this. As it is, here we are leaping and bounding into the unknown.

Our theme for October is Grace and Compassion. How do we travel through life gracefully, mindful of all the fellow travelers with whom we share the road? How do we find our center? Where is grace even in crisis? Where is compassion even in an unequal pairing of ability?

Religious education is in full swing. We are offering new programming this year, including Theology on Tap, a meditation group, Family Fun Night, and new interest groups, which you can read about in more detail elsewhere in this newsletter. Our physical space is increased with the availability of the common area in the parson-

age. And we will offer opportunities for new member classes and leadership development. I'm thrilled to be venturing out into the open, where anything might happen.

Every day, we have the opportunity to do things. Mostly, we are consumed by our normal routine. I get up at 6 AM (although sometimes I wake a little earlier). I often make coffee. I shower 4 times a week on alternative mornings. I do the Sudoku Wednesday through

Sunday, while listening usually to NPR. I'm not totally habitbound, of course. I just do pretty much the same things most mornings.

I do go to the local coffee shop. I don't like chain stores. Chains are a blight on our country. We have gone from a nation of shopkeepers to a nation of clerks in part-time positions, and this is partially due to chain stores, chain restaurants, and chain businesses of all sorts. I try to stay away from the chain stores, and shop locally. For coffee, I prefer Dunn Brothers. It is a chain business, true. But the local store is locally owned. Another chain, bigger and flashier, has opened across the street. So, I try to go to Dunn Brothers whenever possible, and sometimes schedule meetings there. I was going to look at the roof of the parsonage, and stopped my car at the Dunn Brothers drive up window to get a coffee. I ordered a large dark coffee, just coffee. The bozo in front of me was halfway around the corner, and I thought "How rude!" Of course, when I got around the corner, I found there were several vehicles in front of the vehicle directly in front of me. I finally got to the window, and was getting my money ready when I was told that the coffee had been paid for by the person in front of me. What a pleasant surprise! I'm really glad I didn't honk at that person...

That is a small gesture, but it certainly brightened my mood. Since I was already late to the inspection, I hurried along, but did feel a lift in my thoughts. Tomorrow, I will go to Dunn Brothers, and I will do the same for the person behind me. This type of small kindness can really put a person into a good mood. When you buy that coffee, you get the nice feeling of the generous person, and when you get the coffee free, you get an unexpected surge of gratitude. It's called "paying it forward." I think the notion is that you return the favor, such as I plan to do tomorrow.

Perhaps you too might consider this small act of kindness yourself. And doing it at a local business is my preferred choice. That helps the person in the next vehicle, and supports a local business.




October Happenings

The Finance Committee is happy to announce that the refinancing of the church and parsonage has been accomplished. We are in the process of moving accounts to Home Federal Bank from the credit union. Our loan is now at 4.5%, with significant sav-

ings being realized. Please be patient with checks that seem to be funny colored or notes from Vanco or the like which indicate that your money is not in the bank that we are used to.

On going needs of the church and parsonage have meant some increased expenses. We have resurfaced floors in the RE rooms and will soon replace the roof on the parsonage -- sorely needed maintenance that has been deferred for more than six years now. With a combination of volunteer labor and frugal spending, we have managed to do what needs to be done within the budget.

Kathy was united in marriage with Daniel B. Coughlin on July 28, 1990, in Sioux Falls, SD.


Kathy enjoyed the outdoors, gardening, bicycling, kayaking and her cats. She especially enjoyed spending time with her family and friends.

This is to be a bias awareness training aimed at service providers and others who are engaged with minority or other underrepresented populations. The seminar will run from 3-7 p.m. Friday, Oct. 30, and from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 31,

Areas of focus will include gender, race, sexual orientation, age, ability, class and religion. In our multicultural and diverse culture, the interaction of groups and individuals of many walks of life is a daily occurrence. The goal of this seminar is learning to navigate the differences and gain awareness of our own place in the mix.

Our hope is to offer continuing education credits for professionals who take advantage of this training.

Retreat and Workshops to Build Leadership Skills, Deepen Faith



In November, All Souls will launch an exciting leadership development curriculum aimed at both new and seasoned leaders beginning with a retreat weekend at Shalom Hill Farm in Windom, Minn. "Harvest the Power" is a Tapestry of Faith curricu-

lum offered by the Unitarian Universalist Association which seeks to "not only to strengthen the skills and the confidence of individuals who have accepted a leadership role in our congregations, but also to provide the intentional faith development of integrated leaders who model healthy personal, spiritual and leadership practices."

The retreat weekend will run from 5:30 p.m. Friday, Nov. 6, to 3 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 7. Meals are included. Lodging will be at Shalom Hill Farm retreat center, which offers double-occupancy rooms. The All Souls board of directors will cover approximately half the cost of the retreat, which will make the cost to participants \$25 each for the weekend. Members of First Unitarian from Sioux City, Iowa, will be invited to join the retreat.

The curriculum will then continue with workshops one Thursday night each month from December through March here at church in Sioux Falls. The focus of the opening weekend retreat will be identity. "Participants will explore their own leadership and religious journeys, the meanings of power and authority, and turning points and change opportunities in their lives and congregations." The next two sessions, in December and January, will focus on purpose, or what ends we serve. "Participants explore the choices they make and how leaders can honor their own needs along with the needs of others in the leadership group and the congregation." The final two sessions, in February and March, will focus on path, "inviting leaders to learn skills and ways of thinking which will enable them to lead a congregation through change processes in a healthy way. This unit introduces congregational system theory and explores ways for leaders to respond to congregational conflict and difficult behavior."


